

Our Living Village: Anthony, Cleopatra and Seer Green!



This coin was struck around 32-31BC, probably in Patras, Greece. It is the earliest evidence of Roman culture from our immediate area. It is a Mark Antony silver denarius: on the front is a galley and the inscription 'Coin of Antony augur one of the Triumvirs organising the Republic;' on the reverse is a legionary eagle between two standards, and 'Legio II,' his 2nd Roman Legion.

The Romans did not invade Britain until AD43, so what story does this coin tell?

Following Julius Caesar's assassination in 44BC, Mark Antony defeated the conspirators, and he and Caesar's favourite, Octavian (the future Augustus), became the two most powerful men in Rome. Antony aligned with Cleopatra, thwarted Octavian's ambitions and civil war ensued. This culminated in the Battle of Actium in 31BC, one of the largest naval battles in the ancient world. Octavian won a crushing victory and Antony and Cleopatra faced a showdown in Alexandria the following year, but both committed suicide rather than face being paraded as Octavian's prizes.

Antony maintained a private mint which travelled with him, enabling him to secure loyalty by regularly paying his soldiers. To build his 'war chest' he produced 25 to 35 million coins; a volume so huge that Antony's legionary denarii comprised around 20% of all denarii in the Roman Empire 100 years later. They were also of inferior silver content, so there was no incentive for the imperial government to recall them!

The 2nd Legion were later used by Claudius for his invasion of Britain; they established their base at Alchester, near Bicester. In 2021 this coin was found near to the Roman Road between St Albans and Silchester, which passes through Hodgemoor Woods.

Seer Green Gardeners

If you haven't already done it, now is the time to tackle a rampant Wysteria: - your efforts can pay handsome rewards in greater and more prominent flowering. While it's leafless, you can easily understand its structure and decide on which parts to remove. There's a great video on the RHS website to help.



- Prune any shrubs which have flowered during winter along with hedges and climbers such as ivy or Virginia Creeper - it's important to do this before birds start nesting in them.
- Later in the month, cut back deciduous ornamental grasses to allow spring growth through.
- If you're a broad bean lover, sow them this month so they're well ahead before the blackfly arrive. Parsnips and salad onions can also be sown directly into the soil.
- Winter is a good time to tidy up ponds. Remove weeds from around the edges, and scoop out any leaves that have fallen in and sunk to the bottom. Don't remove them completely – lay them at the edge of the pond so any pondlife caught up in them can escape back into the water.
- The following seeds benefit from early sowing: Cosmos, Kale, Sweet Peas, Tomatoes and Salvias.

Legend says he restored sight to a blind girl, the daughter of his jailer. Valentine is thought to have written the jailer's daughter a letter before he was executed, signing it "Your Valentine". The day became associated with romantic love as early as the14th and 15th centuries through the poetry of Chaucer. Now it is celebrated in many countries of the world.



Actors and Directors part 2

I worked on four films directed by Ken Russell. They were Savage Messiah, Mahler, Tommy (the rock opera) and Valentino. Amongst Ken's other film credits were The Devils and Women in Love. Ken was a demanding director, always seeking perfection and he could be a fiery and difficult person to work for. He could also be amusing and, on occasions, a bully.

Ken loved designing long, very complicated, camera shots, whereby the camera and the actors were constantly moving around. For a camera crew these could be very difficult shots to execute perfectly. On the first film, Savage Messiah, I quit within the first two weeks. I was the first assistant cameraman (focus puller) on the film. My job was to keep the film in focus.

Early on in the second week I screwed up on one take and I asked if we could do another take. Ken flew into a rage and I decided that I wouldn't put up with this for another eight weeks, life was too short. I had a good reputation within the industry so getting another film to work on wouldn't be difficult. I went to see the producer and told him I was leaving the film. Ken, by this time, had calmed downed and apologised. After that our working relationship became warm and friendly. One day on Savage Messiah we were filming under some railway arches near Blackfriars Station and Ken invited the camera operator and me to lunch. His driver took us to a pub Ken knew well that was nearby. Ken didn't order any food just 3 tankards of his usual. Up came three glass bottomed pewter tankards each holding a pint of champagne. A very liquid lunch!

One day whilst filming on one of our biggest sets Rudolf and Ken had an artistic argument over how a scene should be played. They began shouting at each other and suddenly Rudolf left the stage and returned to his dressing room. Ken, likewise, left the stage via another door and went to his office. The producer had to delicately go from one to the other trying to placate them and get them back on the set. Neither would budge. Meanwhile on the set the rest of the crew were sitting around laughing at the antics they had just witnessed. Filming is very expensive and when you have over fifty highly paid crew sitting around doing nothing on an expensive set in an expensive film stage it's enough to give a producer a nervous breakdown.


Eventually after almost two hours both agreed to return to the set but neither one would agree to be first. The solution, both would enter the stage via different doors at exactly the same time. Two assistant directors with walkie talkies were sent to escort them back to the stage and on a count to ten they came onto the set. They came face to face, grimaced at each other for a split second then both burst into laughter, hugged each other and we were back to work.

Opera, picnics and popping corks!



As I look out of my kitchen window, snowflakes are gently drifting down from a darkened sky, turning the lawn white. It's winter, but on an evening such as this, my thoughts can easily turn to balmy, warmer days, and summer season operas. My husband and I are fans of live opera, and, for many years, we have been regular attendees at various Summer Festival Opera venues in southern England. Summer Festivals are synonymous with beautiful gardens, men wearing smart dress suits, elegant ladies wearing 'those outfits kept for special occasions' coupled with a buzz of excitement, the laughter of good friends, delicious picnics and the popping of champagne corks.

Summer Festival Operas are characterised by long mid-opera outdoor picnic breaks and indoor theatres. Fortunately, venues provide marquees with tables providing shelter from inclement weather.

Summer Festival Opera began in 1934 at Glyndebourne Sussex. Others followed with Garsington Stokenchurch in Buckinghamshire, Grange Park Surrey, Grange Festival Hampshire, Longborough Gloucestershire, Neville Holt Leicestershire and Holland Park London. Waterperry and Bampton, both near Oxford, have outdoor theatres and picnics before the opera begins. In September, there is Fingest Great Barn Opera set between High Wycombe and Marlow. Opera festivals support charities, including working with schools, prisons and local community projects. Sylivia and Charles Crowther of Fingest Opera ensure that all income raised goes to two charities, 'Child Bereavement UK' and 'Action Medical Research for Children'.

Festival operas all have websites, with information about the new season, including ticket prices and when to book.

Seer Green is an excellent location for accessing these opera festivals as a day trip. For ourselves and friends, nothing beats indulging in inspirational music, sublime singing and glorious venues. For one short day you are transported to a place where troubles can simply fade away.



The Maharajah's Well

The Chiltern Society sent us this piece about areas in The Chilterns that can be explored by bike but I am sure you can visit any way you wish.

The area north of Henley-on-Thames

The country house called Greenlands is situated on the north bank of the Thames about two miles downstream from Henley. In 1871 it was bought by the descendants of the founder of the newsagent and stationery company W H Smith & Son, and remained their home until 1946. It then became



the headquarters of the Administrative Staff College, renamed Henley Management College in 1991. In 2008 a merger with the Business School of Reading University created the new Henley Business School. The buildings are clearly visible from the towpath on the south bank of the river, which is easily accessible by bike.

Stoke Row is the site of a well with an unusual history. During the 19th century, Edward Reade, who was from a wealthy family in Ipsden, spent many years working in India. He was involved in a project to sink a well for a village in Benares, where he told the local Maharajah that the area of the Chilterns where his family lived also sometimes suffered from drought conditions. In recognition of the work carried out in India by Reade, the Maharajah provided funds for a well to be sunk in the village of Stoke Row, together with a cottage for the well-keeper and a cherry orchard, which provided a source of income to pay the upkeep of the well. It was opened in 1864 and remained in use for over 70 years. The canopy of the well on top of the cast iron machinery is decorated with a gilded elephant, which was repainted in 2008. It's visible from the main street and costs nothing to visit (maharajahswell.org.uk)

The Chiltern Society

Library Flex

This is Buckinghamshire's new library model which will introduce technology to increase opening hours and enable customers to use library services without staff being present during quieter times. Staff will then be available to offer assistance and answer enquiries at busier times.

The new way of operating will see opening hours in our local Beaconsfield library increase by 23% from June. Amersham Library will pilot enhanced opening times with the library open seven days a week from 7am to 9pm on weekdays and from 7am to 7pm at weekends, an increase of 129%.

The decision to adopt Library Flex follows an extensive 10-week consultation which ran between July and September last year. The consultation sought to understand demand for library services and the need for staff assistance across the different sites.

Two of the key topics raised in the consultation included queries on safety during the times when staff would not be present and how the new model would address inclusion for those with additional needs. To address concerns about safety, new arrangements will include enhanced live monitoring of CCTV, upgraded fire and intruder alarms, occupancy management, electronic locks and safety information to be available in a range of formats including video, QR and braille.

Comments and suggestions from disabled individuals and groups have been particularly helpful in ensuring facilities are inclusive.
