

Thought for the Month

I hope it doesn't cause you distress to discover that I'm not writing this at the start of December. I know, right? Shocking! Writing these reflections a month ahead gives an interesting perspective for the writer, even if we don't let you in on that. We don't want to spoil the illusion. But this month.... well.... It's early November.

In the rhythms of the village and the Anglican church, we are in a season reflecting on death: All Souls, when we remember before God those we have lost; All Saints, when we celebrate historic heroes of the Christian faith; Halloween, which is mainly originally a Celtic

festival about spirits returning from the dead and roaming the earth; and finally Remembrance Day, when we give thanks for lives lost in two world wars. Put all this together with the falling leaves, and death creates quite a backdrop to autumn.

For me, this underlines a few things about God coming as a baby at Christmas. Firstly, it underlines the cost to him in the very act of entering a world framed by death. He becomes a vulnerable child, reliant on his young mother to keep him safe amid the hooves of livestock, and the soldiers of Herod. Secondly, it underlines his companionship: that he walks alongside us, knowing first-hand what life is like. Thirdly, it underlines the magnitude of what he came to do: to strike the decisive blow in the battle against death itself. So amid the holly and ivy, the mince pies and mulled wine, may we hear the angels singing:

Mild He lays His glory by,
Born that man no more may die,
Born to raise the sons of earth,
Born to give them second birth,
Hark! The herald angels sing:
"Glory to the newborn King!"

And so to Good King Wenceslas on Christmas Eve. Do come and join us, snow or not!



The last event of our busy 2024 was held in the Baptist Church in mid October when we welcomed George Lockwood to speak about planning for early summer colour in the garden. George looks after five very large gardens filled with herbaceous plants and is obviously an expert in choosing the right plant for the right place. His talk was a beautifully illustrated plant-by-plant description of where it performs best and how to care for it. Everyone was given a list of plants so we could scribble notes as he spoke. Questions at the end morphed into a general debate about slug treatments - garlic spray was concluded as the most effective, providing you apply it frequently enough. Things to do in the garden in December and January

- Rambling roses flower on the long floppy shoots produced last summer.
 First cut out all the stems that have already flowered then tie in the new ones to the support.
- Cut off the old leaves from Hellebores to provide a good view of their flowers as they emerge in early Spring
- If you're lucky (or far-sighted!) enough to have a supply of woodchip, they make great paths, especially around veg patches. As they slowly rot down, they add nutrients to the soil and also look smart. (Whenever you or your neighbours have pruning work done, contractors are usually pleased to let you have this valuable organic material for free)
- Spread as much mulch as you can over bare soil.
- Plan your plantings for 2025!

Year's Ending

There was a time when one could write about December and January with certainty that frost, bare trees, cold winds and possibly snow would be worthy of mention but in these strange climatic times it is not certain that plants will remain dormant, frosts will break up clumps of turned over soil or that seasons will appear and behave as expected. So we must adapt.

Here on the allotments it has been a mixed growing season at best, although the mice enjoyed the broad bean shoots early on and the squirrels feasted on sweetcorn this summer, crops that made it to the kitchen were somewhat scant.

But we allotmenteers are made of strong stuff and so we clean our tools, sharpen our blades and tidy our sheds. We build the compost heap up and cover it warmly for winter thus both providing winter quarters for whichever animals so choose and preparing some handy compost come the spring in whatever form it arrives next year.

Roughly turned soil will be broken up further by any frost, or covered to warm ready for first sowings. Any tender plants will be mulched to protect them and winter veg will need to be well netted unless feeding the pigeons and deer is your particular delight.

Keep an eye out for the forecast if not regularly visiting your plot, so that you can break the ice on ponds and other water sources; as always don't be too tidy, rotting logs, a heap of leaves - something will call it home for the duration. If you made, were given or bought a bug hotel this year, prepare for visitors!

Don't start seeds off too early, they'll just get leggy while you impatiently wait for warmer weather, there's nothing wrong with allotmenteers having a dormant period too. So make yourself warm and comfortable with some refreshment and a seed catalogue and while away some time daydreaming of horticultural wonders that will delight the taste buds and win success at the village shows. Festive Greetings to all.

My Time at Jordans School 1952-55

For the last few years I have had the pleasure of an invitation in May to talk to Year 1 on this. The half hour is essentially my recollections, supported by a few contemporary monochrome images. Included in this is of course time for questions from the children; these have included "did you have colour in those days?", on seeing a world that was apparently just black and white; and - my favourite - after what must have been possibly an unduly graphic account of the school in the early 1950s: "How did you survive?".

Well, survive I did, as indeed some years before did my sister Jennifer who was part of the school's original intake in September 1943; it moved

to its current site in January 1944. There were only two classrooms, with the cloakrooms and kitchens in the centre of a single storey long, low building- all very different from what they have today! There was no separate Reception class, so the "Infants" class had pupils from aged five to eight- quite unacceptable now, of course. The other was Juniors, aged nine to eleven.

I try to cover some of these points: There were no school uniforms- this was probably based on shortage of materials and money, but I ask them to discuss whether it was a good or bad thing. Did we have computers? What difference do they think that made? We also had to drink a small

bottle of milk every morning - do you think we enjoyed that? A chorus of "no!" inevitably follows that question! However, history like the cane and outside lavatories I have quietly dropped. It's a real pleasure to do- and of course I have a fresh audience each time! Here's to next year.




Seer Green CE School

8 O'Clock Club

The "unseen Emergency Service", biking emergency blood supplies up and around the capital in all sorts of weather in the darkest hours of the night.

Our meeting welcomed Kamran Irani, Chairman of SERV - Service by Emergency Rider Volunteers, whose team working in partnership with the NHS, provides an emergency courier service for Bucks, Berks, Oxon and Northants delivering blood, platelets, human donor milk, other clinical products, surgical instruments and medical papers. They operate across hospitals and laboratories between the hours of 7pm and 6am five days a week, and provide a 24-hour service at weekends and bank Holidays. All our major local hospitals use the Bikers.

More commonly referred to as Blood Bikes, the Charity operates a nationwide service. It started in 1962 when a family member of Margaret Ryerson was in a south London hospital and the blood, urgently needed, was in Edgware. The unsociable hour, the cost of private-hire taxis and courier companies and the diverting of Police/Ambulance services was recognized as a heavy toll. Now, the Bikers' rapid response and free service has saved the NHS hundreds of thousands of pounds in transport costs.

The local fleet consists of two sizes of motorcycles; Yamahas and BMWs. They are police bikes with rear modifications for transportation purposes.



Two 4×4 cars Dacia Duster and Mercedes Citan, support the Bikers. These vehicles are used when the weather is too dangerous for the bikes, or if the temperature is outside the permitted range to transport blood products.

If a bike breaks down on its journey, the 4×4s ensure the payload reaches its destination.

From all walks of life, bikers have to be a minimum of 25 years of age, holding IAM/RoSPA/or Police equivalent certification.

As the Charity says, "One day we may well have the ride of your life".





Our Living Village and the 'Father of Modern Philanthropy'

Philanthropy is defined by the Merriam-Webster dictionary as 'goodwill to fellow humans,' an apt sentiment for this time of year.

If you worship at Holy Trinity this December, consider the Christmas message, whilst listening to the organ. Musical accompaniment to carols has taken place in churches for hundreds of years, but at Holy Trinity organ music has only been possible since the early twentieth century, thanks in part to Andrew Carnegie.

Holy Trinity was built in 1846, on land allocated in the 1821 'Inclosure Act' to the Reverend Septimus Grover, Rector of Farnham Royal, in lieu of tithes. Prior to the church being built, spare a thought for Anglican parishioners wanting to

worship at their 'mother' church having to make the 15-mile round trip to Farnham Royal! Funding for the church came from the curate of Farnham Royal, John Henry Worsley, who became its first vicar, Eton College who held the parish living and Church of England grants; but the organ did not come until later.

And Andrew Carnegie? Born in 1835 in Dunfermline, he emigrated to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1848. He started work for a telegraph company, gained a job with the Pennsylvania Railroad, then developed business interests in railroads, iron-works, steamships and oil, and established the Carnegie Steel Company. He sold CSC to U.S. Steel in 1901 and thus became one of the richest men in history. His philanthropic interests began around 1870 and he is best remembered for his endowment of free public libraries, particularly in industrialised towns throughout the English-speaking world. In 1908 he gave £80 to the Seer Green organ fund.

The pipe organ he funded was replaced by a digital instrument in the 1990s.

Ingredients

- 175g butter
- 225g plain flour
- 75g caster sugar
- 2 Tbsp milk
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 125-150g boiled sweets, assorted colours (approx. 15-20 sweets)

Method

Preheat the oven to 175c Fan.

Sort the sweets into separate colours and crush each set in a plastic bag using a rolling pin. Put to one side.

In a bowl, gently rub the butter into the flour until it resembles breadcrumbs, alternatively use a food processor. Then stir in the sugar.

Add the milk and vanilla essence and mix to form a dough either by hand or in a food processor.

Roll the dough on a floured surface to 5mm thick. Using biscuit cutters of your choice cut out shapes.

Place the dough shapes on baking trays lined with baking paper.

Carefully remove a dough circle from each shape using a smaller cutter Continue with remaining dough off cuts.

Fill each dough hole with a teaspoon of crushed sweet crystals taking care not to spill any on the edges.

Use a skewer to make a smaller hole in each shape if you wish to hang them.

Bake in the oven for 12-15 minutes or until golden.

Leave the biscuits to cool completely to allow the sweet centres to harden.


Thread a ribbon through the small hole if desired.

Note: if hanging biscuits consume within 24 hours, otherwise store longer in an airtight tin.
