

Open week at Jordans' Village Nursery school

In the idyllic Jordans Village, just off the village green, you will find the Jordans Village Nursery School. A wonderful nursery where laughter, creativity, and a love of learning are nurtured by a caring, knowledgeable staff team. Open Mondays to Fridays in term time, the Jordans village hall is home to this very special nursery.

The nursery is well established and is staffed by a passionate, dedicated and experienced team. Many are former parents and have worked at the nursery for many years, including four qualified teachers. All our staff are qualified in paediatric first aid and child protection, and two team members are SEND (Special Education Needs and Disabilities) trained.



We have a great outside space for trikes, a sand pit, mud kitchen, scooters, water play, and more. We play outside whatever the weather as snow and rain provide opportunities for learning too! Planned into our curriculum to give children variety and a broad range of experiences are activities such as music and movement, visits to the woods, and cooking. We also have a Spanish speaking teacher who



introduces the children to Spanish culture and language. A favourite with the children are our science and technology sessions which include activities such as making volcanoes, building bridges, and learning about our skeletons.

We have nature on our doorstep and use the village green and visit the woods frequently. The children run up and down the dells, hunt for bugs, collect sticks and peep in the dens.

We have strong links with the community and with Jordans School. Our children visit Jordans School regularly in their final term to

help prepare them for their move to 'big school.'

We are an inclusive nursery and welcome all children. We offer flexible hours to suit your child's needs. Children can start at the age of two.

8 O'Clock Club

The Canadian Red Cross Memorial Hospital at Cliveden was a famous and respected local landmark. It was with thoughts of bravery and a nod to nostalgia, when the last of the hospital buildings closed and the ground on which they had stood made way for a large housing development.

The story, from National Trust Volunteer Ray Istead, began at the start of WWI when the Astors of Cliveden offered their house and grounds to the War Office for a military hospital. The War Office declined the offer citing unsuitability, and so an approach was made to the Canadian Army Medical Corps. They accepted, and the hospital that started life in the indoor tennis court of Cliveden, was named the Duchess of Connaught Canadian Red Cross Hospital. The Duke of Connaught, Prince Arthur, was Governor General of Canada.

The Army Corps staffed and equipped the hospital. Linen and night attire (2 of) plus a bed and mattress, was purchased from Selfridge Ltd for two pounds eighteen shillings and thruppence. In 1915, the first Matron of the Canadian Army Nurses was Edith Campbell, subsequently a recipient of the Military Medal for bravery whilst serving abroad.

Nancy Astor was a regular contributor to hospital life, welcoming and visiting patients and arranging entertainment for the sick and wounded. For the patients, the journey to the hospital was long and uncomfortable, eventually arriving at Taplow train station for onward passage by ambulance to the hospital.

The site was used again as a hospital in WW2, but this time the Canadians built a new hospital that was the size of a small village. At the end of the War it became a national research centre for children suffering from rheumatism,

before it passed into the hands of the NHS who introduced Maternity services. It closed in 1985.

Summertime at the allotments

Down at the allotments, sitting on a bench one early Sunday morning I drank in the sights, sounds and scents. The birdsong - wow! There is a great variety of birds up here, from the tiny but loud wren to the stately red kite with its less grand cry. Blackbird proclaims his handsome qualities while throwing tilth hither and thither in search of worms and the ubiquitous allotment robin, always happy to see me disturbing the earth, grapples with a very long worm which he dissects into manageable portions. From a nearby field this chorus is joined by the donkey calling out good morning sounding rather like a barn door in need of an oil, reluctantly opening.

Later as the sun hits my patch the bees will come foraging amongst the poppies, while butterflies sun themselves, wings out flaunting their beauty. Over the pond damselflies do their magical mating ritual while various winged pollinators drink their fill. I can't hear ladybirds munching on black-fly but I hope they are.

Late afternoon the martins will give their fantastic aerial display as they catch insects on the wing, flying high and swooping low, looping and sweeping, truly wondrous. At dusk if you're very lucky you might see the barn owl out hunting, flying across the scrub on the edge of the field, a silent and deadly hunter of mouse or vole. During the night, badger and fox will search out worms and slugs, leaving ankle busting holes for the unwary, while moths feed at the evening primrose flowers.

All this while our allotments bring forth fruit, flowers and vegetables - and however we approach our plots, whatever we choose and strive to grow, when here we can blank out any worries, stresses and woes, immersed in the quiet beauty all around us.

Can you wonder that I call my plot, my happy place.




Garden jobs for high summer

- Keep on top of those tomato side shoots these emerge from the joint between each set of leaves and the stem. If you leave them in place, the plant becomes over-leafy to the detriment of fruit development. This assumes you're growing a cordon variety. Bush tomatoes are designed to sprawl and will make their own space providing you've given them room so you don't need to worry about side shoots.
- Pick courgettes before they become marrows!
- Keep flower displays looking good for longer by regularly cutting off faded flowers of bedding plants and perennials which you expect to make more flowers this year (check the particular plant online if you're not sure). Make the cut right at the bottom of the stem rather than leave a bare stalk.

Dead heading makes the plant put its energies into producing more flowers rather than seed heads (ignore this advice if these are what you prefer!).

- Collect seeds from veg and flowers to sow next year. This generally works well and saves money providing you're not growing an F1 (hybrid) variety.
- Keep on top of watering during dry spells, but remember that plants appreciate larger quantities LESS often to



superficial frequent watering - evaporation means that most of what you apply won't reach the roots.

- There are some wonderful displays of wysteria around our village during late spring, and if these have inspired you to plant one, do check out the RHS website on how to ensure they look good and flower well. By July you'll see lots of very long whippy new shoots have appeared. These need shortening back to five or six leaves. Then make a note in your calendar to prune these same shoots back further to just 2 or 3 buds.
- Relax and reflect on the fruits of your efforts!








Savill Garden is by Lindy Hardy

Our Living Village: Hodgemoor Woods - heritage and wellbeing!

The annual Council for British Archaeology (CBA) public Festival of Archaeology, held nationwide in July, is again running a local event this year. As the Festival theme is Archaeology and Wellbeing, what could be better than a guided walk exploring 2000 years of human occupation within the area of Seer Green parish now covered by Hodgemoor Woods? Also with the chance for some therapeutic 'woodland bathing' or to hug a tree!

As a community-based heritage project, Our Living Village has again partnered with the Buckinghamshire Archaeology Society (BAS) to offer two walks this year, on the morning and on the afternoon of Sunday 27 July. Booking is essential as the number of attendees is restricted. However, the walks are open to the public and are bookable either from the Festival website at https://tinyurl.com/259xy242, or directly with Buckinghamshire Archaeological Society at https:// tinyurl.com/4srbpzpn. There is a small charge for non-BAS members, with money being collected on the day; this goes towards supporting the charitable objectives of the county archaeological society.

A hidden gem in the centre of London - All Saints Church, Margarets Street

Take a break from shopping in Oxford Street and, walking from Oxford Circus past the new IKEA, turn north into an area called Fitzrovia. This area of London used to be the centre of the rag trade, but now is populated by advertising, film and TV companies. In a few minutes you will come across Margaret Street and there, squeezed between offices and homes, find the stupendous church of All Saints, one of the great monuments of Victorian architecture.

The exterior is red brick with colourful inlay decorations and the tower is high, taller than the towers of Westminster Abbey. Walk through the small courtyard and on entering the church you will be overwhelmed by the great size of the interior, but also the most striking brightly coloured mosaics which decorate the walls, floor and ceiling and east wall.

The Church was built in 1849 and 1859, only a few years after Holy Trinity in Seer Green Church, at a cost of £70,000 making it one of the most expensive churches. It was designed by the prolific Victorian church architect William Butterfield who also designed several Oxford college chapels. His instructions were to build a church which would



restore spiritual pride having open alter so there is no screen or pulpit to obscure it but only a low richly decorated wall

It is a high church with a strong musical tradition. The choirs have sung at coronations including that of Elizabeth 11. William LLoyd Webber, father of composer Andrew and cellist Julian, was Director of Music for 10 years.

After enjoying the beauty and peace of this fine building, return to the noise and bustle of the West End.

Children's activity - Make a Miniature Garden

Have fun building your own garden you can create and look after yourself. Use for imaginary play and to help you tell stories.

You need:-

- 1. A bowl or flowerpot preferably with a large surface area.
- 2. Line it if you want to protect it for other use.
- 3. Put some gravel or broken pot pieces in the bottom for drainage.
- 4. Fill to about 2cm from the rim with compost.
- 5. Use Miniature Rock plants, alpines and herbs that stay small and grow slowly for greenery and colour. Succulents can be good. You don't need many 3 or 4.
- 6. Use small rock chippings like slate or gravel to make paths or flat areas. Egg shells broken up look good for paths and Sea shells help add pattern and interesting shapes.

Plan your garden:-

Is it a park, zoo, woodland, garden?

Where will the paths go?

Where will the plants go?

What are you going to put in it?

Use Lego or Playmobil figures or create your own.

Use sticks or recycled cardboard to make a shed, little house, cave or furniture.

Let your imagination go wild!

Hello Beautiful - Anne Napolitano

The publishers use Little Women meets Elena Ferrante as their tagline for this book, not too sure about that, but it's a very enjoyable read, perfect for a beach!

A family saga spanning decades following the Padavano sisters, an Italian family from Chicago. 4 sisters, all so different, Julia, the problem solver; Sylvie, the romantic dreamer; Cecelia, the free-spirited artist; and Emeline, the caregiver.

Meet William – a lonely young man who finds solace in basketball becoming a skilled player. Julia decides he's the one for her and he is thrust into the loud, lively family dynamics.

However, William is fighting depression and anxiety about his life just as Julia is planning their future. In the midst of a tragic crisis, the family is shattered by decisions made and vows broken


It is a beautiful, raw and lyrical look at family, grief, mental health, and love and how to reconnect after a life changing rift.

Dream Count – Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's 4th novel is powerful and compelling as always, exploring the nuances in the relationships between both partners and friends.

This novel is a kaleidoscope through which we peer into the lives of 4 women and their experiences not only of love, filial and romantic, but of power in all its subtleties and cultural contexts.





Set during lockdown, It captures the confusion, fear and dilemmas that were familiar to everyone in that time without it overtaking the plot

Strong feminist political opinions make this a riveting read, not sure she's a huge fan of the USA!

Fundamentally is the perfect mix of funny and enlightening. There is no better feeling than when we can thoroughly enjoy reading whilst also learning.

The main character, Nadia, is an academic who's sent to Iraq to rehabilitate ISIS brides whilst escaping a failed relationship from her girlfriend and her mother.

She makes for a complex protagonist whose inner dialogue is engaging to read as she battles with her moral compass, her ex, her mother and the life she might have lived if things had gone differently.

I laughed whilst reading it, occasionally worried that I shouldn't, given the subject matter, but that is what makes it such an engaging book.

The author is a recognised expert on contemporary Iraq and has had a decorated career as a peacebuilder.

After the novel she talks about how her work inspired the novel and the experiences that she drew on to write it. I found it fascinating, her experience adds to the novel's uniqueness and authenticity.

Thoroughly recommend this - take it on holiday!




