

In early May, we had a Taster Day, and it was a wonderful success. Across the morning, we served around 150 drinks to people of all ages and stages, in a wonderful atmosphere of welcome. We know it won't be like that every day, but we do hope that it will be a place where everyone can come, especially those who feel isolated or alone, and find faithful friendship. And really good coffee that far exceeds everyone's experience of 'church coffee'. And cake too!

Welcome, hospitality and friendship sit at the heart of the Christian faith and are a big part of why we're doing this café. (That, alongside the opportunity to make everyone feel more comfortable around the church space, and less cautious about what it would be like to come on a Sunday...).

Jesus was a very friendly person - everyone who met him found unconditional welcome as they arrived, and inspiration to be a better person as they went on their way. For all the confusing mysteries surrounding the doctrine of the Trinity (the idea that God is Father, Son and Spirit, in perfect love), the reason it's so important to Christians is that it is really about friendship in its perfect, archetypal form. God IS love; when we come to him, we are loved and welcomed into the circle of loving friendship in which he already exists.

Toddlers in the Woods turns 4 in July

I am so proud that this venture, conceived during the isolating Covid years, has sprung into life and now retains an integral position in the lives of many of the young families in Jordans and Seer Green.

The innovative idea for many of getting outside in the woods regardless of the weather early on a Friday morning was very alien to families awakening in a post Covid world. With determination to find others isolated during their young children's lives they sourced long since used outward bound clothing, similar for their children, and headed out. The outcome has been just amazing!

Bridget, Nora, Rachel and I welcome all families with pre-school children

and a donation of about £2.50 is optional though much appreciated. All our equipment is woodland based and purchases are simply to bring to life what is already right there surrounding us.

The Centenary Clearing was created as a legacy for the inspired group of Christian Friends who in 1919 seized the opportunity to create a vibrant working community on the fields opposite the historic Meeting House.

Today the Centenary Clearing lies in the Parish of Seer Green and Jordans and Holy Trinity Church hosts and guides Toddlers in the Woods in the direction of following the Christian faith. However all of any faith, or no faith at all, seeking companionship and a rewarding experience for your young children are so welcome to join us.

Mrs Agnes Cameron - Should auld acquaintance be forgot...

The name Agnes Cameron, who recently died at the age of ninety-nine, will be familiar to every family in Seer Green who had children at our local school in the 1970s and 1980s. To others perhaps less so, but her important legacy lives on in the village to this day.

Mrs Cameron was already a highly experienced teacher in Scotland when in the mid-1970s she moved south with her husband and two daughters, taking up the position of Deputy Head Teacher at Seer Green C of E School. Within a short time she was appointed Head

Teacher, and leading a team of dedicated colleagues she set about transforming the school into the progressing and cosmopolitan place of learning that we see today.

As a fine pianist herself, music was naturally one of her top priorities and a school orchestra and marching band were quickly established. These played an important part in the rejuvenation of the Cherry Pie Fair, where local celebrities such as Val Doonican and Ian McCaskill helped to turn this into a major village event.

Foreign language teaching was another of Mrs Cameron's priorities, and working with local volunteers many of the children reached a remarkable high level of competency. In fact one of the children from that time, now himself a university professor, recently stated that he spoke better French at the age of eleven than at any other time in his life!

The language teaching was reinforced by an annual school trip to Carantec in Brittany, with Mrs Cameron setting off confidently for France driving the school minibus. Memorably, on one occasion setting off a bit too confidently, leaving behind the bag containing all the children's passports, resulting in an

exciting chase along the motorway to catch up with the speeding minibus.


As well as raising educational standards, Mrs Cameron oversaw a major reconstruction and redevelopment programme for the school, leaving as her physical legacy the fine modern school that the village enjoys today.

In her retirement, Mrs Cameron continued her musical activities becoming Friends' secretary to the Amersham Music Festival, singing with the Holy Trinity Church Choir and the South Bucks Choral Society, and expertly accompanying

many local students through their stressful music exams. Being a good Scot, golf also played an important part in her life but not more than her travelling and – most importantly of all - watching her family expanding and flourishing. And fittingly, her very last trip back up to her beloved Scotland was for the marriage of her granddaughter. Later she welcomed her great grandson to the family which brought her enormous joy.

An Allotment per se helps you work, rest and play

The month of May sees work up at the allotments intensifying, with those seedlings which have managed to break through being hardened off, then back safely inside or under cover as the weather does its extreme thing... hot hot - cold cold cold - dry dry dry - but the weeds seem to thrive whatever the weather throws at us: so can we relax in June? NO! But hopefully we can enjoy the long days, celebrate the longest day and begin to anticipate the fruits of our labour, whilst not sacrificing all of it to slugs and pigeons. As people opened up compost heaps and covered beds slow worms were discovered, and some of us will have the inconvenience and delight of a robin nesting in their shed or bees nesting underground in readyto-use-now compost heaps.

What a privilege to be thus chosen.

A word or two about bees...late spring often sees honey bees swarming. This is when the old queen leaves home taking about 20,000 worker bees with her.They carry a packed lunch of honey in a sac in order to build a honeycomb to house the new colony, it's all about procreation and the noise is not anger but the hard work of being airborne when carrying luggage. If a swarm is coming in your direction, stillness is better than running

or flapping about. Think of it as a miniature murmuration such as starlings conjure.



Bees are not aggressive but defensive. When they sense danger they will defend, pheromones trigger a response. A bee will sense strong perfume or aftershave as a predator - danger! And like a good social creature will take one for the team, remember a honeybee dies after stinging. Bees need water so if you have been bothered by bees when watering your plot, provide a safe, simple watering site by putting pebbles in a plant saucer of water, bees safe - you safe.

Meanwhile enjoy the light, take care of your back and plot on....

Seer Green Gardeners

This is the month when typically we start to see the first full flushes of growth in the garden, but after this year's remarkable April, I'm wondering whether our plants will still have the same energy in June? Here are some suggestions in the hopes that May will not have been too cold or dry for normal routines to apply.

- If you've not already done so, gather some suitable sticks or bamboo canes and stake herbaceous perennial plants to show them off to best effect.
- Pinch out the side shoots on tomato plants that emerge from the joint between the leaf and the stem. This retains the plant's energy for developing fruit rather than more leaves and prevents the plant from becoming a messy bush.
- Keep sowing carrots as they're so delicious to eat straight from the garden. I've had much more success growing them in large containers raised off the ground using bricks to help drainage.
- As risk of frost should have passed, you can put houseplants outside for a summer holiday and finish planting out summer bedding.
- Keep on top of weeding!
- Will this be the year when I remember to cut back my hardy geraniums flowers after blooming? Apparently they sprout new growth very quickly and produce more flowers later in the year.
- By now, most bearded irises will have finished blooming. Remove seed heads as this will sap the plant's energies. Remove the stems and if your clump is getting big, lift and divide it into separate plants. (I did this last year and was astonished at the positive effect on flowering this year).
- Don't forget to water new plants regularly until they're well established.
- Above all, enjoy the profusion of colours, textures and shapes to be found in your garden in this most exuberance of months in the gardening year!

Seven people enjoyed the bird song walk through Hodgemoor Woods on a beautiful Bank Holiday Monday morning. The leader, local bird expert Richard Tomlin, was able to identify the birds through their song rather than by sight as they were hidden in the tree canopy.

A wonderful time was had by many wandering around the village in search of Scarecrows over the early May bank holiday week. There were 34 to find, on the theme of Children's book characters.

Judging was by public vote, where people were encouraged to vote for their top 3 (first place gave 3 points, second place gave 2 points and third place scored 1 point).

The winning entry, with 122 points was Rapunzel by Paul and Janet Stewart. 2nd place, with 75 points went to Postman Pat by the Sew 'n' Sews. Third place, with 58 points, went to the Hungry Caterpillar at Holy Trinity. Charlotte's Web (48), Paddington (44), Stickman (39) and Peter Rabbit (33) were all highly commended. Whilst these received the most votes it was lovely to have scarecrows popular with everyone and all entries received at least 2 votes.

Our Living Village: Seer Green and the Ancient Order of Druids!

Who were the Godolphin's, after whom Godolphin Road is named?

In 1752 Francis Godolphin (later 2nd Baron Godolphin) purchased land in Seer Green from Thomas Coke, Earl of Leicester. Francis died in 1785 leaving no heir, so the barony became extinct. In 1832 it was recreated for Francis Godolphin Osborne, 1st Baron Godolphin of Farnham Royal, the second son of the 5th Duke of Leeds.

George Godolphin Osborne was born in 1862, becoming the 10th Duke of Leeds in 1895 following the death of his father (the 9th Duke), and inheriting the title 4th Baron Godolphin together with the Seer Green estate. He lived at Hornby Castle in Yorkshire.

In 1887 George was elected Conservative MP for Brixton, entering Parliament as the Marquess of Carmarthen. From 1887-90 he was Assistant Secretary to 1st Baron Knutsford (Secretary of State for the Colonies). He served as Treasurer of the Household from 1895-96, was a member of London County Council, a JP for the North Riding of Yorkshire, a Lieutenant in the Yorkshire Hussars, an honorary Captain in the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve commanding the Royal Yacht Squadron, and an aide-de-camp to Edward VII. Altogether a very establishment figure!

At the end of the 19th century, he was initiated into the Fraternal Society of the Ancient Order of Druids, and was present in 1905 for the first mass Druid ceremony at Stonehenge. This event is now repeated every summer solstice.

George was noted for racing greyhounds. He incurred gambling debts which resulted in the sale of Hornby Castle in the 1930s. It is tempting to conclude that this hobby probably also contributed to George selling off his Seer Green estate in 1901 and 1912.

Orlando Florida is high on many children's bucket list. The charity 'Dreamflight' makes that experience possible for thousands of seriously ill and disabled children, and for whom the Disney trip delivers a lifechanging experience. It's all made possible by Bucks' resident Patricia Pearce, through her career as an Air Stewardess.



For 39 years, Pat's flying days took her all over the world, in aircraft remembered with fondness such as the Bristol Freighter that transported cars as well as passengers; the de Havilland Dove; Dakota DC-3; Airspeed Ambassador (Elizabethan); Bristol Britannia; Vickers Viscount 748. She flew during an age where hat and coat racks and ladies' dressing tables were appropriate.

A six-week Training Course, consisted of learning how to handle passengers, knowing how to complete the necessary paperwork; serving and cooking meals that included the carving of meat; make-up with Elizabeth Arden; first aid, and very importantly safety and fire fighting. Her stewardess uniform at B.O.A.C. and BA went through many stylish innovations, including the donning of a paper dress for the flights from New York to the Caribbean; real DIY where the wearer had to cut the dress to length!

Flying had been a dream for Pat since the age of nine and in 1986/87 that dream took shape, as the holiday of a lifetime for seriously ill and disabled children.

Starting with a big Disney-themed party, Pat was challenged to turn this party into a party-trip to Orlando, initially flying 288 children aged 8-14. Thousands of children across the country, nominated by medical professionals, have now experienced the fantastic Orlando Parks' events, supported by medical and airline staff and large numbers of volunteers on both sides of the Atlantic.

The experience can be lifechanging and gives young people an opportunity to do something that medicine can't, they discover independence, confidence and a new outlook.

To do this Dreamflight need to raise over £1m each year. https://www.dreamflight.org to donate.

- 3. Floral Displays (hanging baskets, tubs, planters, flower beds etc).
- 4. Community facilities (Village Hall, Community Centre, Church Hall).
- 5. General environmental features (hedges, verges, ditches, etc).
- 6. Shops and pubs.
- 7. Bus stops, bus shelters, public seating, dog bins, notice boards, information signs.
- 8. War memorial.
- 9. Evidence of community engagement (eg website, newsletter, magazine, posters and general community involvement in the Competition).




News from Seer Green CE School



I thought it would be good to suggest a few books which are now in paperback that I highly recommend.


Bear Town - Fredrick Backman

A wonderful debut novel.




All The Colours Of The Dark - Chris Whitaker

Raspberry Meringue Cake

This summer dessert is simple to make. Either prepare one cake and slice it in two and sandwich together or make two cakes and sandwich both together for a larger version.

Ingredients

Sponge Base:

125g butter, softened

100g caster Sugar

2 egg yolks

5ml (1 tsp) vanilla essence

60ml (4tbsp) milk

100g self-raising flour

Meringue Topping:

2 egg whites

150g caster sugar

50g hazelnuts, chopped

To Serve:

300ml double cream

225g fresh raspberries

Icing sugar to dust



Method

Pre heat oven to 170°c Fan. Line a large rectangular baking tin (approx. 25×35 cms)

with lightly greased baking paper.

Make the sponge base first, beat together the butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

Add the egg yolks and vanilla essence.

Gently fold in the flour and combine with the milk.

Spread the sponge mixture thinly in the lined baking tin.

Whisk the egg whites until firm peaks form, add the sugar one spoon at a time while continuing to whisk.

Cover the sponge mixture with the meringue topping and spread evenly.

Sprinkle the chopped hazelnuts over the meringue,

Bake in the oven for 25 minutes. Turn off the oven and leave the cake in the oven for a further 10 minutes.

Remove from the oven and allow to cool completely. It can be covered and left overnight at this stage if you need to make it in advance.

Lift the cake out of the tin using the paper and cut in half and place one half on a serving dish (or if you are making the larger cake place this layer on a serving plate. Make sure you remove the baking paper.

Whip the double cream until soft peaks form, then cover one half of the cake with the cream and evenly sprinkle over the fresh raspberries before you carefully place the other layer on top. Dust with icing sugar before serving.
