Thought for the Month

On a sunny springtime day in Seer Green, it would be easy to think that there was nothing wrong in the world. I have been absorbed with planting seeds, watching them emerge; my spirits lifted by bright primroses and tulip buds on the point of breaking open (I write in April). My world seems full of hopeful anticipation and joy - until I listen to the news and imagine the lives of so many where hope must feel in very short supply as the waves of world events or natural disasters break over them and sweep their ordered lives and plans away.

I feel the discomfort of living in the tension between those contradictory states of life and



even though we can reach across the divide in both prayer and generosity; it can feel as if the destructive and chaotic forces in the world are too large for us to make much of an impact. Where are we to find hope in such a world?

Theologian Jurgen Moltmann writes of hope as an active force that drives us toward a future not vet realised but promised by God. Through Lent I read a collection of essays by young writers who dare to take the promises of God seriously, to re-imagine the world and to play their own part in creating the change they long for. It was entitled, 'Wild Bright Hope.' One of them described Christians as 'prisoners of hope' - the wild, bright hope that is born out of the contradiction between the cross of Good Friday and the empty tomb of Easter Sunday morning; a hope that cannot be extinguished.

This is the power that enables a TEAR Fund aid worker speaking from the rubble of Mandalay to say, 'Even in the hardest time, kindness and hope remain.'

Seer Green Gardeners - gardening jobs May 2025

If you're reading this issue before the end of April, a reminder that our Community Plant sale happens on **3 May**. We do hope dedicated gardeners will support this by bringing along donations for us to sell. Based on previous years, having labels on plants make them very much more attractive to customers!

Suggestions for keeping busy in the garden in May!

After such a dry bright April, it'll probably be a good idea to check that young plants, including any trees or perennials planted last autumn have sufficient water. The use of ungloved fingers gently exploring the root ball gives the most accurate indication of whether a plant needs watering. Horticultural research is increasingly pointing to the amazing role of soil microbes in supporting moisture delivery to plant roots, so it's important to avoid root disturbance from overenthusiastic weeding!

Thinking back to the great 2024 battle of the slugs, I've decided to try sowing many more annuals this year. I figure that while it's still dry, and providing I remember to water them, annuals should get a head start and be large and strong enough to withstand the arrival of hungry molluscs. That's the theory anyway! Good ones to try are sunflowers, calendula and cosmos which bloom well into October or even later.









Who doesn't enjoy the flavour of fresh basil through summer? Home grown from seed, the flavour of the resulting plants is far superior to that of floppy supermarket specimens. Give it a try following directions on the seed packet. They like a warm sunny position and I find I get best results from growing Basil in largish pots.

Finally and importantly, May is the month where Spanish Bluebells form their seed pods. Please remove these to help protect our lovely but endangered indigenous species - they are much more delicate, have darker and droopier flowers.

This is a SOB STORY

I found this little creature, a small white butterfly, floating on the surface of a water butt at the allotments, some wing damage having occurred. Early emerging butterflies in search of nectar feed on spring flowers such as dandelions, daffodils and primroses. Other favourites for butterflies are knapweeds, thistles, teasels, ragwort, vetch, birdsfoot trefoil (aka eggs and bacon). I can almost hear the hackles rising as ' perfect lawn ' enthusiasts and horse owners read this list, but this is about spaces for butterflies not bowling greens or paddocks, aficionado of both can plant a buddleia as a butterfly friendly alternative.

Our butterfly population is in crisis, cold wet summers don't help, but loss of habitat and food supplies, somewhere to lay their eggs (nettles are a common choice), pesticides on caterpillar food sources - all these things make for a crash in population.

You may ask "What have the butterflies ever done for us?" Well, apart from being members of the all important pollinators group, providing foodstuff in the form of caterpillars for young birds, and the sight of them bringing joy to the hardest of hearts...apart from that, butterflies are the canary in the coal mine to the outside world.

Their absence is a warning, their loss is an indication that things are out of sync.



So, once again I make a plea for a bit of colourful disorder in our plots and gardens, some bug friendly spaces, so that we never lose the joy of spotting our first Peacock butterfly of the season.

Sob story? It stands for Save Our Butterflies!

8 O'Clock Club

It may seem like a leap from Seer Green during Roman occupation, to some words written by author Margaret Atwood: "As we know from the study of history, no new system can impose itself upon a previous one without incorporating many elements to be found in the latter....".

I was reminded of this as speaker Nigel Rothwell took us on a journey across the Chilterns through Seer Green and onwards to the Thames Valley. The Chilterns was rich in Iron Age Hill Forts, so it's not a surprise that the Romans gravitated to prosperous areas of a previous civilization.

Neither is it a surprise that truths that had been held absolute, have been queried and refuted in latter ages; from the Ancient Greek Mathematician proving the earth was round not flat, to LiDAR technology today that has tracked Seer Green's Roman Road as taking a different path than previously recounted.

Our Roman Road, the Camlet Way, which in modern tongue was the St Albans to Silchester Road, (and no less important than Ermine Street), ran North-East to South-West through Hodgemoor Woods. Silver Denarius has been found nearby. The silver content of the metal gave the coinage longevity; although dateable, unfortunately there's no telling when it was dropped, lost, and by whom!

Whilst generally there is little to be gained by digging up a Roman road, LiDAR has revealed much more about how these Roman roads were constructed, enabling re-interpretation, and demonstrating that ours is the "best-preserved section of engineered Roman Road within the Chilterns".

As the Thames has changed its course over time partly due to glacial activity, so too has our local landscape been altered by ridge and furrow ploughing, extraction pits, railways, motorways etc; a mirror to habitation. For what we know here and now, view the website. Our Living Village.

Hope to see you there!





Our Living Village: Seer Green's Wordsworth connection!

During springtime we might fondly recall the Poet Laureate (1757-85) William Wordsworth's poem 'Daffodils.'

William had a cousin Robinson, born in 1775 also in Cumbria, who worked as a Customs Collector at Harwich. In 1799 Robinson was at Walton, Suffolk, prevented by adverse weather from apprehending suspected smugglers; and on another occasion, investigating someone being taken out of the country dressed as an Irish woman, without being registered at Woodbridge Custom House!

In June 1799 a Secret Service payment to 'Mr Wordsworth' was recorded in the accounts of the Duke

recorded in the accounts of the Duke of Portland (Home Secretary under William Pitt the Younger); annotated that Mr Wordsworth befriended a French agent on a voyage to Hamburg. The Hidden Wordsworth, by K.R. Johnston (published 1998), alleged that this was government spy William, travelling to Germany with his sister and Samuel Taylor Coleridge, during heightened European tension following the French Revolution. However, it was Robinson the Customs Collector, who was arresting and taking to London two men accused of treason.

Robinson retired in 1834, later settling in Seer Green. Robinson's son, Reverend C.F. Wordsworth was Deacon of Gillingham, Dorset in 1840, Rector of Fyfield and Curate of Ebbesborne Wake, Wiltshire 1844-51. In 1851-56 he was resident in Seer Green, during which time he was on the Board of Guardians for the Amersham Union Workhouse.

Robinson died in Uxbridge in 1856, and the Reverend C.F. Wordsworth instructed the sale of Ponds Farm in May that year. The 1851 census records Ponds under the name of Grimsdale, and the 1861 census under the name of Howard (of Howards Road and Crescent). It seems likely that Reverend Wordsworth occupied Ponds Farm between these years, and that Robinson was lodging with him.

One of London's hidden gems - 2 Temple Place



Getting to 2 Temple Place from Seer Green and Jordans is easy. You take the train to Marylebone and the Bakerloo line tube to Embankment. Then there is a short walk, through the magical Victoria Embankment gardens. Look out for the Watergate, in one corner of the gardens, it was built in 1626 as an entrance to the Thames for the Duke of Buckingham. The Thames waterline has receded, and the gate is now about 100 metres from the river. A pretty open-air café in the gardens is a great place to stop for a coffee and you can also pop into The Artist's Garden, an open-air art exhibition site on the rooftop of Temple Tube.

You leave the gardens and 2 Temple Place is on your left. This extraordinary building was built in 1895 by the Gothic revival architect John Loughborough Pearson, as the money-no-object estate office of William Waldorf Astor. He also bought Clivedon in 1893. 2 Temple Place's interior expresses Astor's lifelong love of literature and art but also reflects his family's complex history and their connections to Europe. 2 Temple Place is open for exhibitions, art and craft workshops, concerts and for tours of the building.

2 Temple Place will be open during Open House London Festival September 13-21 2025, when I am told the windows will be open revealing their amazing views of the Thames.




Wigginton and The Ridgeway

A nice walk through woods and along ridges with lots of historic context

Length: 6 miles

Start point: Greyhound Inn, Wigginton

Difficulty: Easy



This is a fairly flat walk above the Chiltern escarpment and across fields, woods and a country park. Start from the Greyhound at Wigginton (park on the road or pub car park if visiting afterwards) and take the footpath opposite the pub between houses and then downhill across a field. At the path junction turn right up the hill and follow the path past some allotments to a small road. Turn left for 100 metres then take the path on the right in front of a house and follow this back up to the Chesham Road. Do a small zig zag right along the road and then left onto another path across fields. You can miss out this first section by walking back from the pub along the road if you like but it's a bit busy.


Follow the path straight on across fields and through copses. The ditch in the copses is a Grims Ditch or Dyke – Iron Age constructions that are thought to have been used to demarcate land. Where muddy it may be best to walk either side of the copses along the field edge. Cross two small roads and keep following the line of the ditch until the third road where you turn right and walk along the road for 500 metres until you reach a wood just where the road descends sharply. Turn right onto The Ridgeway which is the higher of the two paths and follow that near the edge of the wood for just under a mile until you come out on a road. Carry straight on along the road (bear slightly right in Hastoe) for ³/₄ mile to Hastoe Cross then turn briefly left at the road junction and then, as you enter the woods, right on to another path.

This path quickly opens out to become a pretty boulevard as it passes through Tring Park with lovely views to the left. The land is owned by the Woodland Trust and the house was built by the Rothschilds. Follow the paths (and the map!) through the woods for about a mile turning right as the path starts to descend more steeply, and then right again back into Wigginton where you can walk through the houses back to the pub.

My favourite character is the indomitable DI Pru Freebourne, whose ability to eat and drink at all times is worthy of my admiration!


